A LETTER FROM OUR **EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR** Demian Lawrenchuk

Our Executive Director is a traditional community harvester from Fox Lake Cree Nation who is driven by the Inninwuk (Swampy Cree) teachings.

Learning all he can from the land and the Elders, Demian spent much of his adult-life harvesting from the land, as dictated by the seasons. This developed in him a strong will, and committment to pass on the invaluable lessons and skills he learned to the next generation.

With Food Matters Manitoba, Demian has inspired the organization to help support other communities in sharing their knowledge with their youth toward food security and community empowerment. As I reflect on Food Matters Manitoba's journey through another year, I find myself deeply inspired. I find myself humbled, excited, proud and hungry for the road that lay ahead. As someone from a northern Indigenous community here in Manitoba, I am familiar with life in the North. I am familiar with the infamous challenges that first come to mind when we think of the region - the issues that dominate the news and thus the common perception.

Yet, I am just as familiar with the spirit of the north - the beauty and depth of culture whose origins trace back to time immemorial. These are cultures that were born through a union of people and the natural world, through endless evolution as the natural cycles of life harmonized together. These are cultures that year after year, endured the unrelenting intensity of the long annual freeze, celebrated the explosion of life welcomed by the annual thaw, found meaning in the smallest details such as the way a particular leaf would hang on a certain species of tree at a precise time of year, while understanding the unbroken connection of all of creation tied together in all directions of time and space.

These are the cultures that could not be extinguished, the people that could not be stopped. This is the power of the north that I know. Like the seasonal cycles, our people have endured a dark and cold winter of hardship, but now, as a people, we celebrate the explosion of life as we reclaim our identities - wearing our beauty and power with pride.

The journey of our organization is one of learning, adaptation, relationships, commitment and celebration. It is dedication to the long road of systemic change and an investment into long-term solutions that deliver short-term benefits every step along the way.

Throughout this past year, we have continued to harness the powerful spirit of the people of the north along this journey of wellbeing and empowerment. This past year, we have continued building relationships, hiring people in their communities, supporting the production of local healthy food, mentoring youth, empowering elders to share their knowledge, and so much more.



FOOD MATTERS

Food Matters Manitoba is an Indigenous-led organization that is addressing the root causes of food insecurity in Northern Manitoba by creating systemic change. We work to enhance community access to local food sources through education, training, mentorship, and positive relationships.

We prioritize people over projects, mentorship over workshops, and employment over volunteerism - offering both immediate and long-term support to our 13 partner communities. For Indigenous communities, life always centred the pursuit of food from the land.

The word for life, "pimatisiwin" translates to, "following that which has been given to us from the Creator."

WHAT GUIDES US

→ Relationships

are at the forefront. Understanding the complexity required to establish healthy, thriving communities drives us to build local teams and foster a thriving community throughout the region.

→ Food Production

is viewed through the lens of the seasonal cycles as a sustainable holistic system for life, wellbeing, and community engagement.

Language and Ceremonies

are valued and understood for their impacts of creating strong, stable, and committed individuals and communities.

Indigenous Culture and Knowledge

are leveraged to utilize existing strengths to build from and create powerful, resilient momentum.





IN 2023, FOOD MATTERS MANITOBA HIRED **2 FULL-TIME HARVESTERS** AND **8 YOUTH HARVESTERS** IN **5 PARTNERING COMMUNITIES**, LEADING TO THE FORMATION OF **3 DEDICATED LOCAL TEAMS**.

HOW WE DO WHAT WE DO

By partnering with 13 Indigenous communities in Northern Manitoba, Food Matters Manitoba supports capacity building initiatives towards the development of enhanced community food systems - tackling food insecurity in the north through community driven change.

Traditional and healthy foods are a powerful and sustainable means to reduce food insecurity in our partner communities.

These partnerships are centred around **trust and respect - drawing on the strength, experience, knowledge, and traditions of Indigenous Peoples.** We look to each community's strengths that can be supported, while providing new opportunities communities are looking to add.



Our support varies from agricultural support to livestock, harvesting resources, medicine and ceremony support, infrastructure support, our harvester program, and youth harvester program.

By addressing communities' unique and individual needs, we work together to build local food systems and support long-term communityled initiatives to reduce food insecurity.


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

In 2023, FMM supported community-led projects of the following types:

Our support system is a process that works to create incubators for change: an active and layered support structure of employment, materials, equipment, and education, enabling community members to harvest, innovate, and navigate challenges within their communities, while building up the foundation for an Indigenous community food system. This approach is strengths-based and focuses on empowering and building-up individuals and local teams, engaging communities to unite the region. We have established deep roots in communities as a result and are successfully creating impacts within the challenging environments of Northern Manitoba reserves.

2023 HIGHLIGHTS HARVESTER PROGRAM

The Harvester Program is a solution co-developed through our Northern partnerships. Harvesters **collect local and traditional food sources** through **hunting, fishing, trapping, and gathering.** Food Matters Manitoba provides both immediate and long-term support to traditional and local harvesters in our participating communities.

Immediate support is provided through honoraria, equipment, travel and supplies.

Long-term support is offered to dedicated traditional harvesters who are interested in creating a measurable impact in their communities through full-time employment. Traditional harvesters are elders, community members, and youth - preserving key Indigenous traditions and passing down knowledge to the next generation. At Food Matters Manitoba, we work to bypass barriers and challenges in current food insecurity interventions. We strongly believe in employing individuals who are working towards important food initiatives, community wellbeing and fostering selfdeterminative environments.

The Harvester Program is aligned with the principles of Indigenous food sovereignty, selfdetermination, and environmental and fiscal sustainability. The goal is to provide traditional food that is healthy, local, and readily available year-round to the community - particularly to elders and families needing extra support.

In 2023, the Harvester Program ran in Norway House, Brochet, Fox Lake/Gillam, Crane River, York Landing, and Sherridon.

Youth play an integral role in ensuring local food systems thrive in the north.

The Youth Harvester Program provides opportunities for youth to safely go out onto the land with one of our experienced harvesters to learn from them - enabling traditional knowledge to be passed down through hands-on learning and connection.

The Youth Harvester Program emphasizes the positive impact being out on the land has on individuals. It promotes **physical health, emotional and spiritual well-being, building good relationships, and respect toward the land and others.**

It inspires a sense of **responsibility for the knowledge shared**, all while getting back to **traditional roots**, **providing for the community**, and **eating healthy** and **traditional foods**.



YOUTH EXPERIENCE HIGHLIGHT SIDNEY CASTEL 2023, Sherridon, FMM Youth Harvester

Food Matters Manitoba was looking for several youth to become full-time community youth harvesters. **I decided to join the community food initiative**, which meant I would get **to hunt and gather** in the **Ancestral/Traditional Territory of the Kiciwapa Cree Nation.** In the last year, I travelled to many different locations.

Floyd North, my grandpa was my guide and teacher. His extensive knowledge of the **history, culture, language & practices of the land were great life learning experiences.**"



I love passing on my **knowledge** of the **land** to the **youth of my community**.

I try to help them see that **there's more** than just sitting inside on a video game or watching TV."

SCHOOL GARDEN IN SPLIT LAKE

Vivian Lin, teacher and dedicated community member champions the school garden project at Split Lake school. She expresses,

We're trying to give them some ideas, to inspire them – that's the thing, to inspire them from an early age, and hope to bring some good changes into their lives."

In 2023, Food Matters Manitoba sent **seeds**, **grow lights**, **and other equipment** needed for gardening to support Lin and the school. The garden has produced **lettuce**, **cucumbers**, **strawberries**, **green onions**, **tomatoes**, **etc**.

Vivian hopes to inspire the children to get back to the land, incorporating land-based learning – teaching the children who may not have access to fresh produce **how to grow their own foods** and make healthy choices. Within each community there are amazing human beings that are **committed to improving the lives of their people** –

leaders within the community, expert harvesters; individuals who are grounded, reliable, and skilled.

In 2023, Food Matters Manitoba sent seeds to our Northern partners in Fox Lake/Gillam for **raised garden beds for elders**.

The garden produced a variety of fresh and healthy produce that were distributed to the elders and community members including onions, potatoes, and tomatoes

CHURCHILL GOOSE HUNT

In May, Community Project Coordinator Lawrence Saunders Jr. brought several youth from Fox Lake/ Gillam and York Landing to Churchill for Food Matters Manitoba's Annual Goose Hunt.

Goose hunting is one of the most important components of Cree culture - it's a tradition that signifies the Cree New Year, a celebration of life as the earth wakes after its long winter sleep.

Experienced hunters such as Saunders accompany and mentor the youth throughout the week - facilitating learning as they harvest and process the food to bring back to their communities.

Hunters and youth are provided with accommodation, supplies, and equipment needed.

IN 2023, ABOUT **80 GEESE** WERE HARVESTED & BROUGHT BACK TO COMMUNITIES.





In March, Traditional Harvester, Lester Balfour, and Community Project Coordinator, Lawrence Saunders Jr. organized a cross-community harvest in Norway House, with support from Elder Gordon Walker.

Youth from Fox Lake and Norway House enjoyed a two-day ice fishing trip, **setting nets for walleye and fishing for trout**. The event included shore lunches, Cree language teachings, and ended with a community feast featuring the harvested fish, fostering engagement with the land, culture, and one another.



The Grow North Gathering embodies the concept that **food security** is about, at least in part, **living the experience of food as culture.**

This year, attendees participated in a variety of workshops and activities including snowshoe making, ribbon crafts, bannock making, beekeeping, fishing, traditional planting, medicine picking, and in preparations for a traditional feast.

It was a wonderful three days full of delicious traditional food, knowledge sharing, youth involvement, and community.
